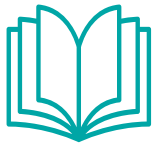

CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE BACCALAUREATE DEGREE PROGRAMS

33 baccalaureate degree programs have been approved within the California Community Colleges. These baccalaureate degree programs (BDPs) are an accessible and affordable way for students to earn the advanced degrees required of the current workforce.

It is projected that by 2030, 38% of jobs will depend on workers with at least a baccalaureate degree. Community colleges seek to offer more BDPs to meet the direct business or industry demands of the local area, ensuring that students gain sustainable employment post-graduation, and that the workforce needs are adequately met.
